Review Questions

Why did Paul feel the need to say that his apostleship is by the will of God?

Why was Paul's divine authority so important in this letter?

Does the "will of God" refer to God's desire to see his commands obeyed (God's stated desire) or does the "will of God" refer to what God ordains to come to pass (i.e. what actually happens)?

Read Daniel 4:34-35, Isaiah 31:21-27, Isaiah 46:10, Ephesians 1:11 - How do these verses refer to "God's will?"

Read 1 Thess 4:3-4 and 1 Thess. 5:16-18 – How do these verses refer to "God's will?"

Paul calls the Colossians "saints." Describe what it means to be a saint.

Colossians 1:2 communicates that we are "located" in two places simultaneously. What are the two locations?

What are the two benedictory blessings Paul extends to the Colossians?
